Program Descriptions

Introduction:

The California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation's, Division of Adult Parole Operations (DAPO) provides a variety of residential and service oriented programs to its parolee population. The following is a brief synopsis of the various DAPO programs currently available for use by Parole Agent referral and/or in lieu of revocation. Program Name: Residential Multi-Service Center (RMSC)

Program Description: The RMSC program offers a variety of services to male and female parolees: that includes drug counseling, literacy training, job preparation/placement, anger management classes, as well as individual and group counseling. This is a six month residential program with participation in a 90-day aftercare program. All RMSC beds are available for either male or female parolees.

Program Name: Parolee Service Centers (PSC)

Program Description: The mission of the PSC is to provide parolees with residency, support services and resources that enable successful reintegration into the community. The initial placement is for 90 days, not to exceed one year.

Program Name: Community Based Coalition (CBC)

Program Description: The CBC provides supportive services to include but not limited to family and job counseling, case management services, substance abuse counseling, community outreach and referrals to partner agencies that will provide employment readiness, job placement, life skills development, housing, and treatment and recovery services for parolees.

Program Name: Substance Abuse Treatment and Recovery (STAR)

Program Description: The STAR Program is a cognitive behavioral education program for parolees. Coed classes meet five days a week, six hours a day for four weeks at local parole offices.

Program Name: Computer Literacy Learning Center (CLLC)

Program Description: The CLLC is a computer assisted instructional program designed to increase the literacy skills of parolees, resulting in increased parolee employability and parolee success.

Program Name: In-Custody Drug Treatment Program (ICDTP)

Program Description: The ICDTP is intended for parolees who have committed violations as a result of drug or alcohol related dependency and/or have a need for a period of confinement and treatment to get their substance abuse under control. ICDTP has a jail-based model, and a community-based model. Each model includes a total of 150-days of mandatory programming. The jail based model includes an initial 60 day in-custody drug treatment phase, followed by a 30 day residential phase, then a 60 day after-care phase. The community-based model includes a 90 day community treatment phase, and a 60 day after-care phase.

Program Name: Day Reporting Center (DRC)

Program Description: The DRC provides services that include but are not limited to substance abuse programs, vocational programs, education services/GED reintegration, anger management, cognitive life skills development, parenting and family reintegration, money management, and job readiness/search assistance.

Program Name: Employment Development Dept. (EDD)

Program Description: The EDD program provides statewide job search preparation, pre-employment services, job placement, and job retention assistance to the parolee population. The EDD works cooperatively with CDCR to accomplish the above stated goals and objectives.

Program Name: Substance Abuse Services Coordination Agencies (SASCA)

Program Description: The SASCA's subcontract with community residential and outpatient substance abuse treatment programs to provide continuing care for parolees. Parolees who have participated in inmate Substance Abuse Programs (SAP), Drug Treatment Furlough (DTF), Female Offender Treatment & Employment Program (FOTEP), Parolee Substance Abuse Program (PSAP) or other programs approved by the Division of Addiction and Recovery Services are eligible for SASCA services.

Program Name: Parolee Employment Program (PEP)

Program Description: The PEP provides employment services to parolees at selected parole field units which are administered by community based contractors. Each parolee is provided with individual employment plans, mandatory job development workshops and placement services.

Program Name: Parolee Substance Abuse Program (PSAP)

Program Description: The PSAP is intended for parolees who have committed violations as a result of drug or alcohol related dependency and/or have a need for a period of confinement and treatment to get their substance abuse under control. The P-SAP is a 90 day drug education program with a voluntary aftercare component.

Program Name: Offender Employment Continuum (OEC)**

Program Description: The OEC program provides services to inmates as they reach 120 days from parole. The program provides a comprehensive three week/90-hour employment readiness/life skills workshop which enables them to transition back to the community's workforce upon parole.

**OEC is an institution based program that provides services to inmates at California State Prison, Solano; Avenal State Prison; Richard J. Donovan Correctional Facility; Valley State Prison for Women and Central California Women's Facility.
